


### **Improving Pedestrian Safety**

## Creating Food Environments and Food Systems in Neighborhoods

- Sacramento City Council adopts an ordinance that would allow community gardens on private vacant lots ordinance (2011)
- Construction of over 115 home, community and school gardens since 2010.

### **Creating Food Environments and Food Systems in Schools**

- Development of a curriculum that integrates school gardens into academic curricula (district-wide)
- Piloting in 5 schools—4 elementary schools (Camellia Basic, Pacific, Oak Ridge, Nicholas) and Will C Wood Middle School







#### SCUSD adopts policies to improve school climate

- Anti-bullying policy (2011)
- Policy that clarifies guidelines and protects transgender and gender variant students (Dec 2013)
- Positive school climate and school discipline policies (June 5, 2014): objective is to reduce suspensions and expulsions
