

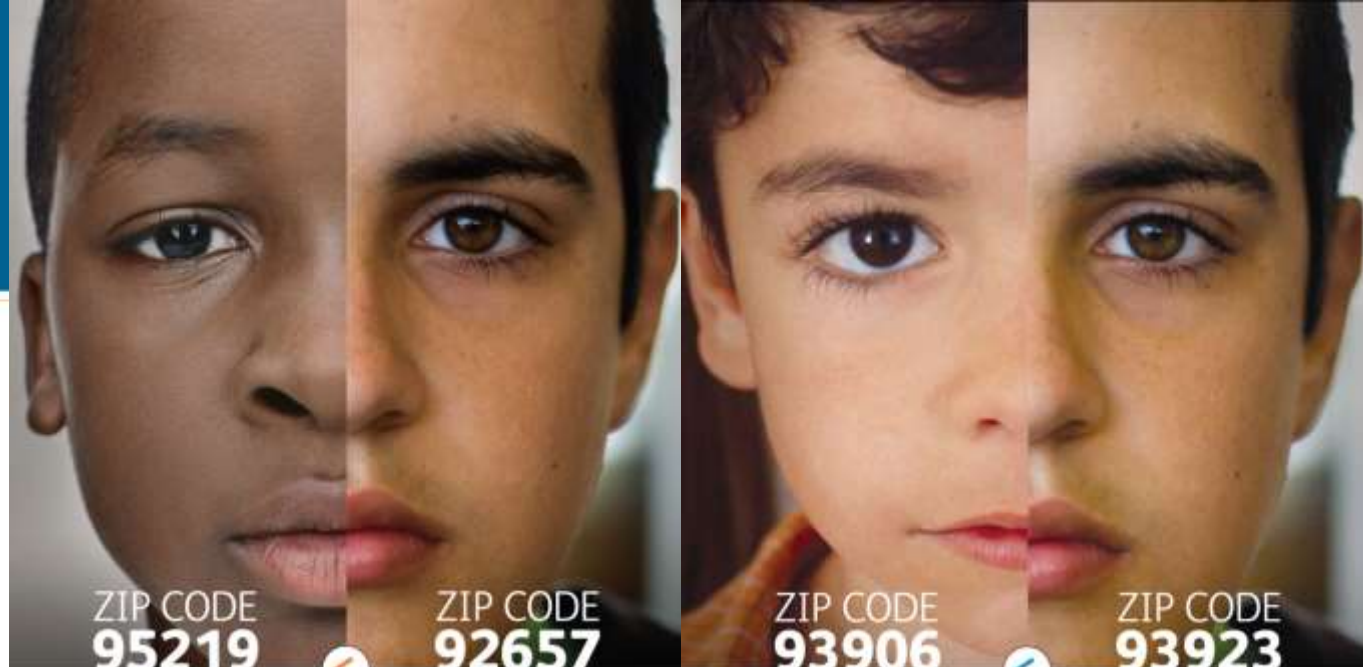

The California Endowment would like to thank California's leaders for taking steps to make our communities and our state stronger.

AB 581 (Perez) : Brings grocery stores to neighborhoods where they are needed.

AB 6 (Fuentes) : Eliminates bureaucratic red tape for families who need access to healthy food.

SB 20 (Pattillo) : Gives Californians the facts about restaurant food.

SB 244 (Wu) : Requires local land use planning to include improvement of disadvantaged communities.



Your **ZIP code** shouldn't predict whether you'll graduate from high school or how long you'll live — but it does.

This year, Governor Jerry Brown and legislators recognized that **Health Happens in Schools and Neighborhoods**. The California Endowment would like to thank California's leaders for taking steps to make our communities and our state stronger.

AB 1221 (Alejo) : Helps disadvantaged communities receive more access to clean water services.

AB 131 "Dream Act" (Cedillo) : Allows undocumented California students to apply for college financial aid.

"Blueprint for Great Schools"
(State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson) : Connects health and fitness to academic success.

AB 9 "Seth's Law" (Ammons) AB 1156 (Eng) : Prevents bullying.

SB 429 (DeSaulnier) : Makes schools with After School Education and Safety Programs eligible to receive a supplemental operations grant.

AB 1330 and AB 790 (Fursten) : Establish the Linked Learning Pilot Program and adds career technical education to high school graduation requirements.

AB 402 (Skinner) : Uses information from school lunch programs to determine CalFresh eligibility for low-income families.

2020 Goals: Health in Every School

Goal #1: Increase social-emotional and physical health practices in schools statewide.

Goal #2: Win increases in funding for school health strategies through the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF).



2020 Goals: Health in Every Neighborhood

Goal #1: Incorporate health equity principles in land use policies, at the city, county, or regional level in all BHC sites.

Goal #2: Increase opportunities and support for underserved youth and youth of color so that more youth stay in school and in the community.



2020 Goals: Health Care For All

Goal #1: Enroll two million children and adults in Medi-Cal by 2020.

Goal #2: Win health coverage for the undocumented at the county level across the state.

Goal #3: Increase the number of persons trained and supported as primary care practitioners in underserved areas.

Improving Pedestrian Safety

Vision Zero Campaign to eliminate pedestrian accidents and fatalities within the Sacramento BHC target area (Kick off January 2015)



Increasing Access to Fresh Foods

- Corner stores offering fresh produce (Sam's and Elder Creek)



Increasing Access to Fresh Foods

- Since 2010, Harvest Sac has gleaned 213,048 pounds that were redistributed to the BHC target area via schools, organizations, events and churches.



Increasing Access to Fresh Foods in Neighborhoods

- Oak Park neighborhood crops swaps
- Building the capacity of Oak Park Farmer's Market
 - Market accepts EBT (2011)
 - EBT sales grew from \$840/week in 2011 to
 - \$1,330/week in 2014



Creating Food Environments and Food Systems in Neighborhoods

- Sacramento City Council adopts an ordinance that would allow community gardens on private vacant lots ordinance (2011)
- Construction of over 115 home, community and school gardens since 2010.



Creating Food Environments and Food Systems in Neighborhoods

- Sacramento City Council adopts an urban agriculture ordinance that would allow the on site sale of produce on urban farms (March 24, 2015)



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In Schools

Creating Food Environments and Food Systems in Schools

- Development of a curriculum that integrates school gardens into academic curricula (district-wide)
- Piloting in 5 schools—4 elementary schools (Camellia Basic, Pacific, Oak Ridge, Nicholas) and Will C Wood Middle School



SCUSD adopts policies to improve school climate

- Anti-bullying policy (2011)
- Policy that clarifies guidelines and protects transgender and gender variant students (Dec 2013)
- Positive school climate and school discipline policies (June 5, 2014): objective is to reduce suspensions and expulsions
