Dear Senate and Assembly leaders,

On behalf of **78** anti-hunger and anti-poverty organizations, we urge the California legislature to support on-time implementation of the CalFresh Minimum Nutrition Benefit Pilot in the 2024-2025 State Budget and reject the proposed permanent cut in the Governor's May Revise budget.

Today, <u>over 5 million Californians rely on CalFresh</u> to put food on the table and feed their families. While this is our state's most important anti-hunger program, benefit levels are too low, and only average about \$6 per person per day. For the roughly 8% of households who are receiving the minimum benefit, they are only receiving \$23 per month, barely enough to cover a loaf of bread, a gallon of milk, and a dozen eggs.

The <u>Thrifty Food Plan (TFP)</u> is set by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and determines the minimum allotment of SNAP (CalFresh) benefits. In 2021, the <u>TFP was adjusted beyond inflation</u> for the first time in more than 45 years, but it fails to consider the exorbitant cost of living in states like California, resulting in woefully inadequate benefit allotments. **If receiving the minimum of \$23 a month**, **a household of one in California would run out of benefits in less than four days**.

We are extremely grateful for the investment in the <u>2023-24 State Budget</u> to fund the CalFresh Minimum Nutrition Benefit Pilot, to provide additional CalFresh food benefits for households that are only receiving the federal minimum allotment of \$23 per month, bringing them up to \$50 per month.

With the ending of COVID-era anti-hunger supports like <u>SNAP/CalFresh Emergency Allotments</u> and Pandemic EBT, combined with record spikes in food prices, this pilot is needed more than ever. <u>23% of all</u> <u>California households, including 49% of Black households with children, report food insecurity.</u> Food Banks are on the frontlines of this hunger crisis every day, facing still-record demand: <u>78% have had to</u> <u>scale back services in some way</u>.

As hunger remains high, we need to protect and strengthen investments in CalFresh, our nation's largest and most important anti-hunger program, serving over 5 million Californians. Especially since:

- <u>CalFresh provides nine meals to every one provided by food banks</u> a gap that private charity could never fill.
- CalFresh<u>supports our food and farm economy</u>. Each \$1 in benefits generates as much as \$1.80 in GDP during an economic downturn.
- CalFresh <u>lifted over 1.1 million Californians above the poverty line in 2023</u> and <u>reduces food</u> <u>insecurity for households on the program</u>, including children.

Thanks to swift and careful implementation underway by the California Department of Social Services, the CalFresh Minimum Nutrition Benefit Pilot will soon ensure older adults and people with disabilities have greater access to food. This is crucial since these populations are already struggling to meet their basic

needs, as <u>older adults are the fastest-growing homeless population</u> and <u>people with disabilities spend</u> <u>almost twice as much as people without disabilities on out-of-pocket medical costs</u>.

California can — and should — join several other states, including New Jersey, New Mexico, Maryland, and DC, that have already taken action to increase benefit adequacy to help mitigate poverty and food insecurity.

We thank the California Legislature's leadership for supporting and leading anti-hunger initiatives to strengthen CalFresh. The state budget is a reflection of our values, and we urge leadership to value a future where people do not go hungry by protecting on-time implementation of the CalFresh Minimum Nutrition Benefit Pilot.
