

End Poverty For Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Older Adults & People With Disabilities



Action is needed to bring Individuals on SSI/SSP up to the Federal Poverty Line .

About 1 million older adults and people with disabilities in California rely on Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and State Supplementary Payment (SSP) income to meet their needs like staying housed, fed, clothed, and healthy.

Current funding levels fall short of what individuals need to live safely and comfortably in California, especially due to the harm caused by recession-era cuts in 2009 and 2011, when California eliminated the Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) and reduced the state portion of the SSI grant.




Our Request to Meet Community Need:

- Provide a five-step increase over five years to bring and keep the SSI/SSP grant at 100% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) as a down payment to the Elder Economic Security Index, which reflects the true cost of living for SSI/SSP recipients. The first step is appropriating \$345M in the 2026-27 state budget.


Maximum SSI/SSP grant for an individual in 2026:
